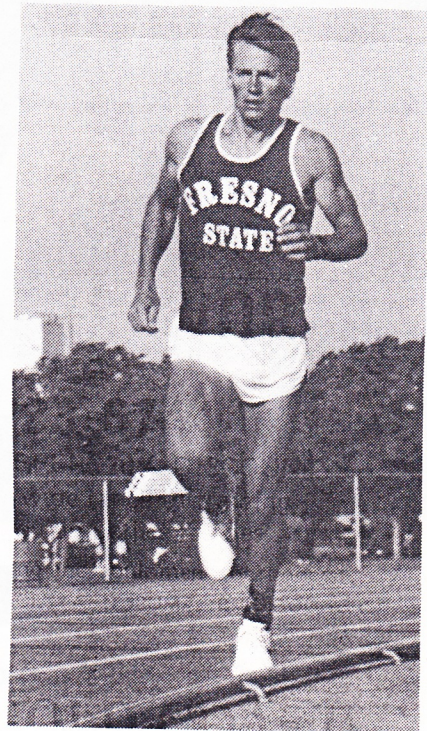
Following this, he lived free at Oslo CPE and worked casual for the Bislett Games meet director.

Brett returned to SA that summer, but in 1983 travelled overseas again, eventually settling on Hancock JC, Santa Maria, California where he went undefeated in cross-country and set a school 10,000m. record of 29.35. In 1984 he transferred to Fresno State where he set a school 10000m. record and qualified for NCAA(Div.1) final. In 1985-86 he held an AIS scholarship in Canberra, the first SA runner to receive a "full ride". However in mid-1986 he left for what have become regular and prolonged sojourns in Europe based mainly at Vastervik, south of Stockholm.

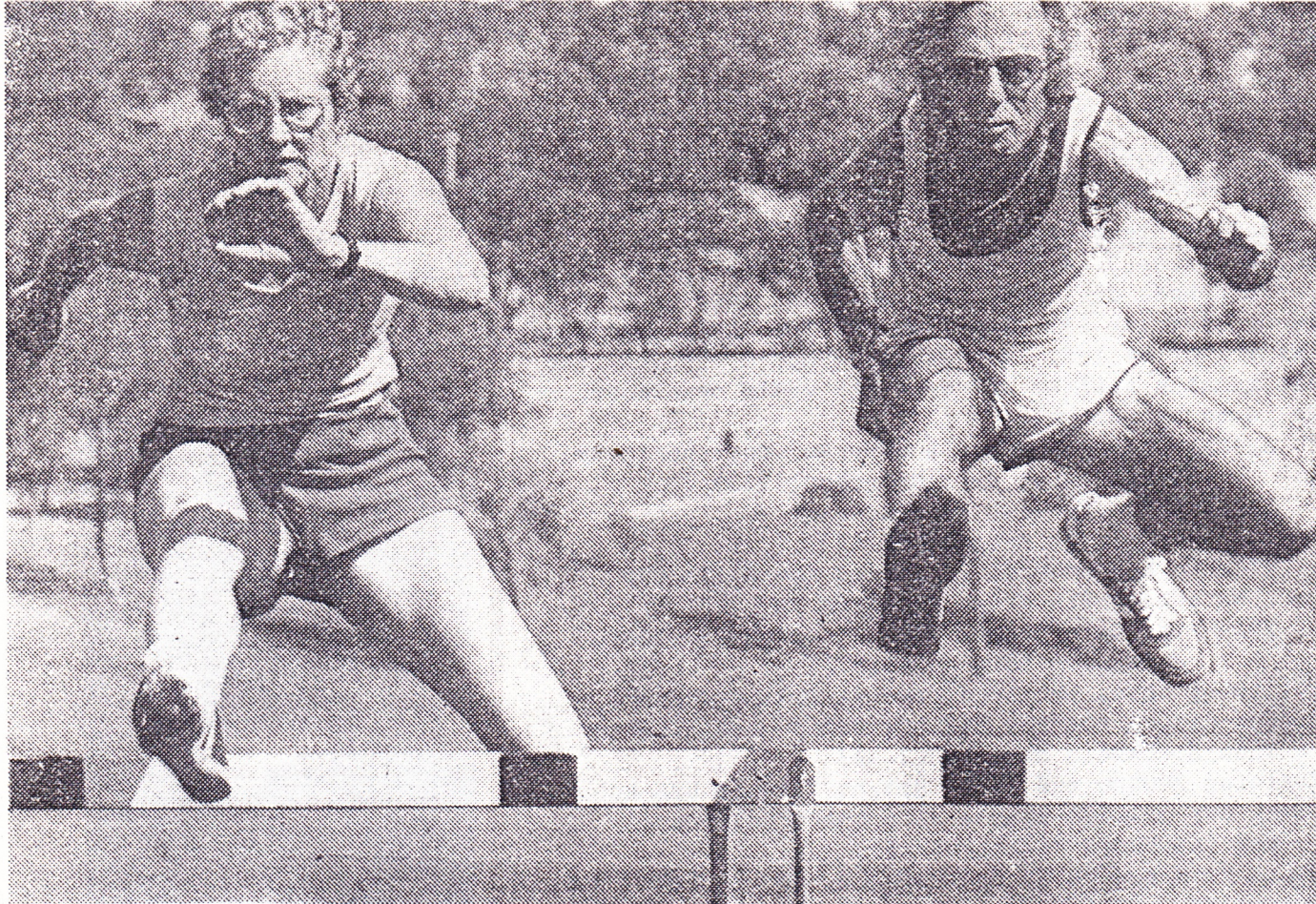
Administration:

You only went to the Commonwealth Games together — but here we see Brenda and Godfrey Parkinson, who have both set world records, AND on the same day.

Though, perhaps, it is fair to say the standards were somewhat different.

The Parkinsons were two of the 10-person teams who set world veteran 24-hour relay records around Adelaide Harriers track late last month.

Record

The women's team, which broke the over 35 year's record with 198 miles, 171 yards, comprised Helen Alderson, Sonia Simpson, Leone Byrnes, Mary Rhodes, Lynn Boyce, Carol Lowe, Sue Worley, Eva Quinn and Sheila Malbut, as well as Brenda.

Joining Godfrey in the men's 50-57 year team, which covered 234 miles, 1191 yards, were Allan Hartley, Frank Murphy, Brian Jones,

Brenda and Godfrey typify the many athletes who are pouring into the veterans movement after "pauses" in their sporting careers—sometimes pauses of more than 20 years.

Brenda, 46, a part-time comptometrist, was a good enough sprinter as a young woman to represent South Africa five times in the 80m.

Moved

She gave up running when she and Godfrey returned to England in 1960 and had a son Regan and daughter Carreen (who has become an SA sprinting and touch football representative).

Godfrey had been a champion schoolboy and club level middle distance runner in Capetown but retired until the family moved to Adelaide in 1963, when Veterans Athletics was just getting under way.

Godfrey joined the men's association, and Brenda helped form the women's a few years later, with Marg Cahill, Aileen Miller and Sheila Malbut.

Since both have been twice to national and international veterans championships, with Brenda bringing home four gold and a silver and Godfrey a bronze from the Oceanic Games in Fiji last May.

To go with her share in the world 24-hour relay record, Brenda holds the fastest Australian age group marks for 80 and 100m hurdles.

Warning—the Woodleys are 'burning'

THE Woodleys are burning — and that news should have the alarming effect of a bushfire alert on the State's junior athletes competing at this weekend's interclub grand final at Olympic Sportsfield.

Robyn and David Woodley, who take the track for Flinders, created history at recent State championships by becoming the first sister and brother to win SA titles in the same event.

Robyn, 14, took the under 16, 800m in 2:17.5, while David, 16, won the under 18 in 1:55.4, both personal bests.

Their wins came from bold front running tactics, one of the many things they share.

Robyn and David attend Westminster School, are coached by Toby Schreier, and represented the State as Mitchell Park Little Athletes.

In the grand final, the surprise packet of the Inter-Club Athletics season, Enfield Harriers, has seen its premiership hopes crash through the ineligibility of star athletes.

State representatives Jeanette Kieboom, Melinda Cilento (both javelin) and Sonia Clapp (400m hurdles) have not qualified due to insufficient appearances in the minor round.

Enfield's demise opens the way for last year's women's premier Port Adelaide to prevail again.

In the men's final, CTC has favorites in Ivan Coles (sprint), Chris Nunn (hurdles), Simon Carthy (long jump), Gregorie Plawiecki (triple jump), Claudio Centofante (shot and discus) and Gary Johnson (high jump).

Enfield should finish second with Leon Mayes (400m), Cameron Bell (800m), Warren Partland (1500m) and Richard Everson (walk) dominating the track.

Happy homecoming for games athletes

About 200 competitive athletes and swim-

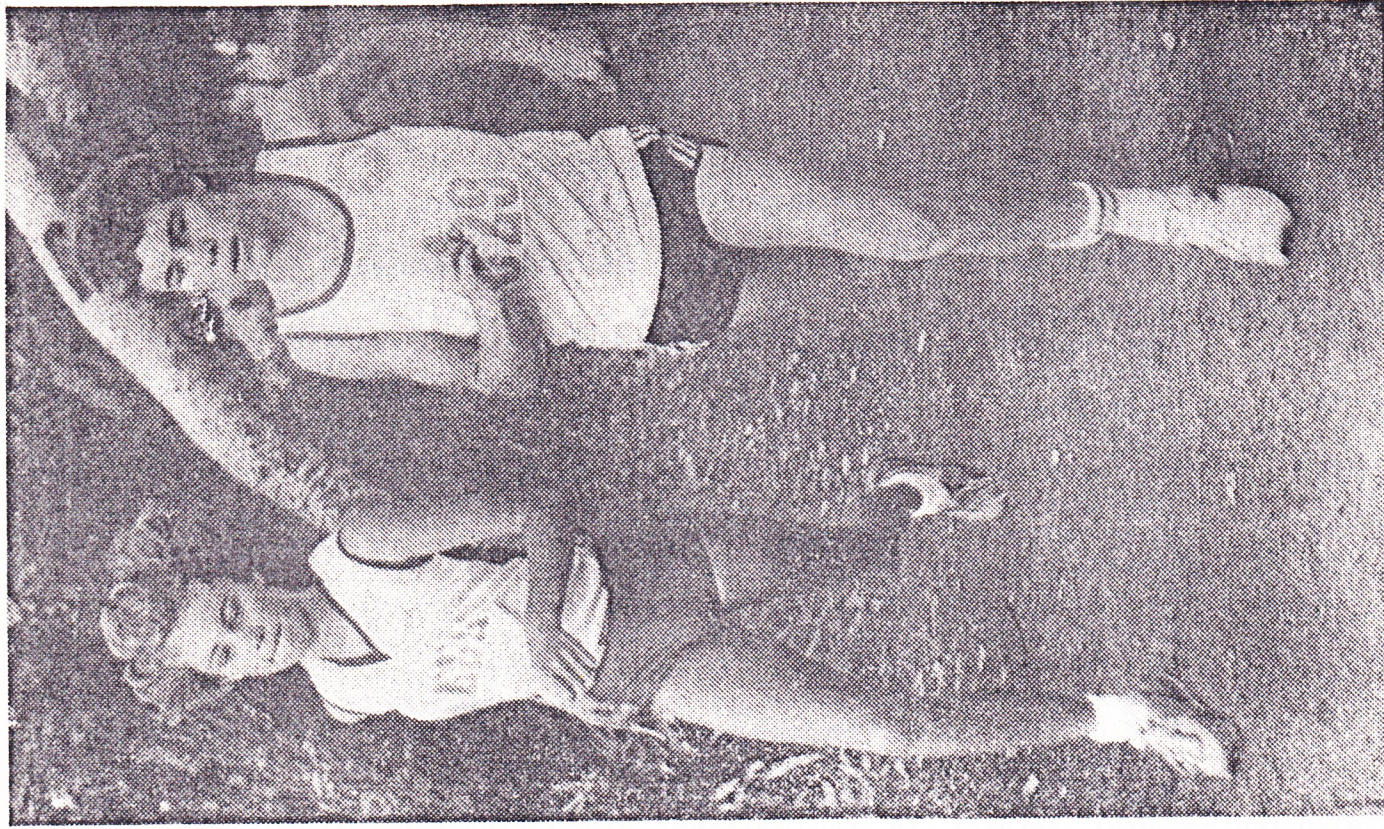
mers went to the games from SA.
